## Primary Research

### Observations

#### Works Cited Entry:

If you are discussing your observations in your own words....

....then there is no need to mention it in your “works cited” page.

- The purpose of providing a “works cited” page is to give credit to the original writer. In your paper, you are discussing a personal observation that only you conducted. You are the original writer, so there is no need to give credit to yourself.
- Example:  
When I walked into the counseling center, I immediately noticed a piece of paper on the wall that explained the policies followed by the therapists at Oakland University.

## Citing Sources in MLA 8: In-text Citations

### In-Text Citation: Author-Page Number

There are two ways to cite in-text when a source has an author and page numbers:

Example 1: **The author's name can go near the beginning of the sentence with the page number(s) at the end.**

According to \_\_\_\_\_, "eating is an agricultural act" (\_\_\_\_\_).

### Sections of a Documentary

Since documentaries are often divided into sections, the title of the section that the citation comes from is what should be cited in-text.

#### In-Text Citation

Example 1: **The title of the documentary, in italics, goes near the beginning of the sentence, and the title of the section, in quotation marks, goes at the end.**

The documentary *Food Inc.* attempts to uncover many of the flaws in the food industry such as the fact that the "top four [beef packers] control more than 80% of the market"

### Video from the Web

The "author" of a TED Talk is the person giving the talk. Since it's a video, there are no page numbers to cite in-text.

#### In-Text Citation

Example 1: **The author's name can go near the beginning of the sentence.**
